


From the Pastor's Desk

TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

The fact that many monastic churches do not have a prominent tabernacle shapes the patterns of liturgical prayer. Monastic communities often protect the ancient value of "receiving from the same sacrifice," meaning that the communicants are assured that what they eat and drink in the Holy Mysteries actually comes from the same celebration. It surprises many to learn that the Church does not foresee, nor does it provide for, Communion of the faithful from the reserved Sacrament. Liturgical laws have long defended your right to receive from the same sacrifice, the same Mass, that you attend.

At one time, of course, the bread for the Eucharist was the ordinary bread of the day, except unleavened, probably prepared at home. It was broken and distributed to the faithful. Early on the loaf itself was referred to as the *hostia* in Latin, meaning the "sacrifice," the same word for the sacrificial animal in Jewish worship, and for Jesus as the Lamb of God. By giving his life on the cross, Jesus became the *hostia* for us. To this day in the Greek Church, one of the tasks of the priest's wife is to bake the bread for the Divine Liturgy, sometimes in a bakery oven dedicated to that purpose and called a "Bethlehem."

Today's familiar individual hosts first appeared in the eleventh century at about the time when tabernacles were coming into use. The turn away from "bready" bread allowed the hosts to be reserved since they did not spoil like regular bread, and made the annual "Easter duty" counts easier.

THE CALL OF THE GOOD SHEPHERD

The Twenty-third Psalm, today's responsorial psalm, is arguably the best known of all the psalms. The line that reads "Even though I walk in the dark valley / I fear no evil; for you are at my side / with your rod and your staff / that give me courage" (Psalm 23:4) connects this week's scriptures to the wonderful story of the road to Emmaus, which we heard last week. The Lord Jesus, our Good Shepherd, is constantly at our side. He calls us each by name, beckoning us into a deeper relationship with him. That call, issued to each of us at the moment of our baptism, carries with it the promise of the Good Shepherd: "I came so that they might have life and have it more abundantly" (John 10:10).

EL LLAMADO DEL BUEN PASTOR

El salmo responsorial de hoy es el Salmo 23 y sin duda es el más conocido de los salmos. Los versos que rezan: "Aunque camine por cañadas oscuras,/ nada temo, porque tu vas conmigo:/ tu vará y tu cayado me sosiegan" (Salmo 23:40 se vinculan en las lecturas bíblicas de esta semana con el maravilloso relato sobre el camino a Emaus, que escuchamos la semana pasada). El Señor Jesús, nuestro Buen Pastor, está constantemente a nuestro lado. Nos llama por nuestro nombre, trayéndonos a una más profunda relación con él. Ese llamado, hecho a cada uno de nosotros en el momento de nuestro bautismo, lleva la promesa del Buen Pastor: "Yo he venido para que tengan vida y la tengan en abundancia" (Juan 10:10)

TRADICIONES DE NUESTRA FE

El 19 de abril en Uruguay se conmemora a la Virgen del Verdún, que está colocada sobre una columna de seis metros en uno de los cerros que rodean la ciudad de Minas. Esta imagen fue puesta allí por el sacerdote don José de Luca en 1990. Su intención era dedicar esta imagen en recuerdo del siglo diecinueve y recibir así el siglo veinte. Dedicándolo a María Inmaculada en honor de Cristo Redentor.

En el 2007 la peregrinación a la Virgen del Verdún llevaba como lema "De la mano de María, discípulos y misioneros de Jesucristo". Este bello refrán nos recuerda que vamos caminando de la mano de María, nuestra hermana en la fe, para ser como ella, discípulos de su hijo y misioneros del mensaje redentor de Jesucristo. No obstante, hay que reconocer que muchos cristianos, especialmente nosotros, los latinoamericanos, nos quedamos solo con María y nunca llamamos a Jesús. Eso a María no le gusta ya que toda reverencia a ella debe abrirnos a recibir a su único hijo, Jesús, y adorarlo como nuestro único Señor y Salvador.

Fr. Feccia's Reflection

«Io sono il buon pastore»— Per quale motivo la figura del buon pastore è stata rappresentata attraverso immagini tanto melense? Eppure nella pagina evangelica non c'è niente di sdolcinato. In un quadro dalle tinte fortemente contrastate si vedono, da un lato, tutti quelli che sono venuti per rubare, uccidere e distruggere il popolo di Dio, dall'altro c'è Gesù che dona la vita in abbondanza. Ad avverarsi senza scrupoli Giovanni oppone Gesù nel suo ruolo di indispensabile mediatore di salvezza.

A partire da questa presentazione, le immagini si moltiplicano e si sovrappongono, dando luogo ad una serie di riferimenti alla realtà che si trasformano presto in controversie. Ai farisei ciechi che non riconoscono i segni messianici, Gesù dichiara: «*Voi non siete che ladri, briganti ed estranei*». Vi siete introdotti in modo disonesto nel giudaismo, e avete rinchiuso il gregge nel recinto dei riti, delle prescrizioni e degli interdetti. Ma la gente non vi ascolta più, non ha più fiducia in voi. Chi dunque porta al popolo di Dio la vera liberazione, la vera conoscenza religiosa, se non Io, il pastore inviato dal Padre, io, che sono la porta delle pecore? Ben lungi dall'asservirle, io le salvo, facendole uscire dalla loro schiavitù, come Dio stesso, pastore di Israele, ha fatto per il suo popolo, nell'esodo dall'Egitto (Es. 3, 12). Esse mi seguono, legandosi non a una struttura, a una ideologia, ma alla mia persona, in cui trovano la fonte della vera libertà!»

Il vangelo del Cristo ci chiama a una vita adulta e responsabile, in una chiesa che non ha nulla del gregge o del giardino d'infanzia. Nel momento in cui nella nostra società, i padri scompaiono, i guru affascinano, la propaganda impone il proprio dominio, Gesù ci mette in piedi, perché camminiamo con lui verso il Padre. Nessuno, infatti, può andare al Padre se non per mezzo di lui. «*Perché restassimo liberi Cristo ci ha liberati*» (Gal. 5,1, **Un potere spirituale** — Israele conservava il ricordo del re pastore, raffigurato da Davide, che avrebbe regnato con la bontà; aspettava, secondo Ezechiele (c. 34), un messia-pastore che, anziché pascere se stesso, avrebbe curato la pecora ferita. I profeti annunciavano dunque un potere spirituale, che si preoccupasse più delle pecore che della ragion di stato. Gesù inaugura questo potere e lo affida alla chiesa. Chiunque contesta questa missione a lui e alla chiesa è «un ladro» del gregge. L'autorità, nella Chiesa non ha lo scopo di irreggimentare le pecore, ma di «*dare la vita in abbondanza*».

Gesù risorto si manifesta nei pastori della Chiesa

L'immagine del pastore che guida le sue pecore era familiare a Israele, popolo nomade: essa alimentò in tempi successivi la meditazione religiosa del proprio rapporto con Dio. I suoi capi dovevano essere servi dell'unico pastore; ma troppo spesso, seguendo interessi egoistici e visioni politiche inadeguate, hanno tradito, fuorviato, depredato il gregge di Dio.

Gesù si presenta come il pastore secondo il cuore di Dio, quello annunciato dai profeti. Egli conosce intimamente il Padre e trasmette questa conoscenza ai suoi (vangelo). Per questo egli è la «porta», il mediatore. Egli conosce intimamente la nostra condizione, perché come «agnello» ha portato i peccati di noi tutti (seconda lettura).

ra). Egli guida i suoi con l'autorità di chi ama e ha dato la sua vita; ed essi, nella fede, ascoltano la sua voce e lo seguono.

In comunione di fede e di amore
Prima di tornare alla destra del Padre, Gesù ha affidato al collegio degli Apostoli (e in modo particolare a Pietro, come capo di questo collegio) il suo *ministero* pastorale verso coloro che hanno già raggiunto la porta dell'ovile e verso quelli che dovranno ancora raggiungerla. Questo servizio rende effettiva la presenza di Cristo risorto in mezzo ai suoi, la prolunga nel tempo (successione apostolica) e nello spazio (collegialità). Come tutte le realtà che appartengono alla Chiesa pellegrinante, il servizio pastorale è di ordine sacramentale, e rimanda al Cristo Signore che,

invisibile, guida i suoi alla comunione di vita con il Padre attraverso i ministri della parola e dei sacramenti. Ma anche nel «governo» e nella responsabilità delle comunità e dei singoli fratelli, i pastori sanno che la loro autorità nasce dall'obbedienza a Cristo che tutto il corpo della Chiesa deve cercare, e di cui essi esprimono la voce.

I will give you shepherds...
Apostolic exhortation of
HH John Paul II

Without priests the Church would not be able to live that fundamental obedience which is at the very heart of her existence and her mission in history, an obedience in response to command of Christ: “Go therefore and make disciples of all nations” (Mt. 28:19) and “Do this in remembrance of me” (Lk. 22:19; cf. 1 Cor. 11.24), i.e: an obedience to the command to announce the gospel and to renew daily the sacrifice of the giving of his body and shedding of his blood for the life of the world.

These words of Saint John Paul II explain the in a very clear manner the importance of consecrated leaders in the Church. Occasionally we encounter faith communities where power struggles damage the mission entrusted to us by Christ himself; ill-intentioned leaders that wish they could run everything ignoring Churches' guidelines and struggling to impose their personal point of view or their own agenda. Lets not forget the importance of being in communion with church-appointed pastors and let us joyfully continue our mission establishing God's Kingdom in the world.

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
