

TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

For centuries, the only Eucharistic Prayer we heard as Western Catholics was the old Roman Canon, usually recited in a low voice by the priest, in Latin. By the 1940s, many Catholics were learning to follow along with the actions of the priest by means of a bilingual missal, with Latin on one side and English on the other. Drawings of the priest's position at the altar, moving from one side to the other, or bowing or standing with uplifted hands at the center, helped the readers stay on track.

The Roman Canon is a long prayer, and since it was done every day for every occasion, priests had a way of galloping through it. Even though long, its structure is fairly simple, with the consecration and sacrifice clearly marked out. Sadly, this surviving prayer had triumphed over many treasures of our tradition that emphasized other dimensions of Eucharist. The *Constitution on the Sacred Liturgy* in 1963 did not call directly for new Eucharistic Prayers, but that direction was inevitable. Discussion began almost immediately, and by 1967 the Vatican approved three new Eucharistic Prayers. In 1974, the Congregation for Worship unveiled the experiment of two Eucharistic Prayers for Masses of Reconciliation, and three for Masses with Children. At last, a period of creativity and enrichment had begun.

THE MERCY, POWER, AND LOVE OF GOD

The first reading today, from the book of Wisdom, makes its point over and over, at least five times in five verses! God is mighty, but lenient to all. God's power is shown in kindness and clemency, not in harshness and condemnation, and those who govern God's people must govern in the same way, with kindness. This loving kindness and gentleness is not contrary to God's might, but is a direct result of God's primacy over all. Who are we, then, to judge what is in the hearts of our fellow Christians and all people, when God commands justice with love and clemency?

Likewise, the Holy Spirit makes up for our ignorance of what we need, speaking in a language we do not yet understand. But God knows our needs before we do, understands the intercessions of the Spirit, and helps us in our weakness. This is our hope: God's mercy, power, and love.

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LA MISERICORDIA, EL PODER Y EL AMOR DE DIOS

¡La primera lectura de hoy, del libro de la Sabiduría, va al punto una y otra vez, al menos cinco veces en cinco versículos! Dios es poderoso, pero compasivo con todos. La fuerza de Dios se muestra en la bondad y la clemencia, no en la aspereza o la condenación, y quienes gobernan al pueblo de Dios deben gobernar de igual manera, con bondad. Esta amorosa bondad y delicadeza no son contrarios al poder de Dios, sino directo resultado de la primacía de Dios, sobre todo. ¿Quiénes somos nosotros, entonces, para juzgar el corazón de nuestros hermanos cristianos y a toda la gente, cuando Dios ordena justicia con amor y clemencia?

De igual manera, el Espíritu Santo suple nuestra ignorancia de lo que necesitamos, hablando en un lenguaje que no comprendemos todavía. Pero Dios conoce nuestras necesidades antes que nosotros, entiende las intercesiones del Espíritu, y nos ayuda en nuestra necesidad. Esta es nuestra esperanza: la misericordia, el poder y el amor de Dios.

TRADICIONES DE NUESTRA FE

Bartolomé de las Casas, el gran defensor de los indígenas, nació en Sevilla, España en 1474 y falleció en Madrid en el año 1566. Su larga vida fue dedicada a la presencia española en América.

Bartolomé llegó a la Nueva España para encargarse de una Encomienda. Después fue ordenado sacerdote y recibió a cargo una encomienda de mineros amerindios. Poco a poco su corazón cristiano le abrió los ojos a las injusticias españolas en América.

Por eso se hizo fraile dominico hizo varios viajes a España en defensa de los derechos humanos de los amerindios ante los reyes de España. Los cuales le dieron tierras en Venezuela y Chiapas para poner en práctica su teoría humanista acerca de los indígenas.

Hasta el fin de su vida este fraile y teólogo dominico luchó por los derechos de los nativos americanos, buscando convencer a los reyes españoles y a los Papas que la conquista no favorecía la evangelización de los pueblos. Gracias a sus esfuerzos se abolió la esclavitud indígena y se instituyó el diálogo, en lugar de la espada, como instrumento de conversión.



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Fr. Feccia's Reflection

Sedicesima domenica del T.O. «Anno A»— Una chiesa di «*puri*», una chiesa settaria: è la tentazione ricorrente di ogni comunità animata da un grande desiderio di perfezione. Già ai tempi di Gesù, Giacomo e Giovanni avrebbero voluto far scendere un fuoco dal cielo per distruggere i samaritani inospitali (Lc 9,54). Nella parola della zizzania emerge un atteggiamento analogo: «*Vuoi che andiamo a strapparla via?*» «*No, dice Gesù, perché non succeda che sradicate con esso anche il grano...*»

Il padrone del campo, dunque, si preoccupa soprattutto della salvezza del grano; si oppone all'iniziativa dei suoi servi perché vuol dare al buon seme tutte le possibilità di crescere. Essi sono compiti dalla quantità della zizzania, mentre lui vede in primo luogo le promesse del grano. Quaggiù, nessuno può avanzare la pretesa manichea di classificare tutte le cose in due categorie ben distinte: bene e male, verità e errore. L'eresia stessa può portare in sé una parte di verità, e la buona dottrina può contenere qualche errore. Si può sentire la presenza dell'angelo nello stesso tempo subodorare quella del demonio. Con le sue ambiguità e il suo carattere composto, la situazione presente è il campo della libertà dei cristiani, in cui si compie il difficile esercizio del discernimento. Si tratta dunque di congiungere, con un grande ottimismo spirituale, due atteggiamenti apparentemente contraddittori. La decisione: voler essere buon grano, con tutte le proprie forze e quindi prendere le distanze dal «mondo» e dalle sue seduzioni, e la pazienza: sapere che è meglio una chiesa che sa essere lievito nella pasta, che non teme di sporcarsi le mani lavando panni dei suoi figli, piuttosto che una chiesa di «*puri*», che pretende di compiere prima del tempo una scelta tra i chiamati al regno. Se bisogna odiare i vizi, bisogna farlo amando sempre le persone. Allora il piccolo seme perduto nel campo del mondo immenso crescerà a poco a poco fino a diventare l'albero, frusciante di uccelli del regno.

La pazienza di Dio — Come può la chiesa, che realizza talora mediocrementre l'ideale evangelico, pretendere di guidarci verso il regno dei cieli? Il vangelo dà una risposta: l'insuccesso è solo provvisorio; l'agricoltore sa bene che, a dispetto di tutto, il suo buon grano non rischia nulla, anzi conoscerà una crescita rigogliosa in vista della mietitura finale. Il lievito non sarà soffocato dalla pasta, ma la farà fermentare: «*Lasciate che l'uno e l'altro (il buono e il cattivo) crescano insieme fino alla mietitura*». Il mito della purezza è la caratteristica delle sette e di coloro che preferiscono non fare nulla piuttosto che sporcarsi le mani. La missione del popolo di Dio, invece, è di immergersi nel mondo, esposti al bene e al male.

La pazienza di Dio...

Da una lettura superficiale della Bibbia (dei salmi specialmente) si potrebbe ricavare, forse, l'impressione di un Dio impaziente, che «brucia le tappe». Gli appelli alla vendetta sono assai frequenti (1 Re 18,40; Sa/82 e 108). Ma i passi più notevoli della Bibbia smentiscono questa impressione. Elia, pieno di zelo geloso, comprende, a sue spese, che Dio non sta nell'uragano o nel terremoto, ma nella brezza leggera, nel soffio del vento più delicato (1 Re 19,9.13). Giacomo e Giovanni si sentono rimproverare per il loro desiderio di far cadere la folgore sui Samaritani che non accolgono Gesù (Lc 9,51.55; Mt 26,51). La Scrittura è il libro della pazienza divina che sempre differisce il castigo del suo popolo (Es 32,7-14). I profeti parlano di collera di Dio. Ma la collera non è l'ultimo e definitivo momento della manifestazione divina: il perdono vince sempre. Dio è ricco di grazia e di fedeltà ed è sempre sollecito a ritirare le sue minacce quando Israele si incammina nuovamente sulla via della conversione (prima lettura).

Gesù inaugura il regno degli «ultimi tempi», non come giudice che separa i buoni dai cattivi, ma come pastore universale, venuto prima di tutto per i peccatori. Non esclude nessuno dal regno: tutti vi sono convocati, tutti vi possono entrare. In ogni atteggiamento della sua vita, Gesù incarna la pazienza divina. Nessun peccato può tagliare irrimediabilmente i ponti con la potenza misericordiosa di Dio (vangelo).

La Chiesa, corpo di Cristo, ha per missione di incarnare tra gli uomini la pazienza di Gesù. Il suo compito quaggiù è di rivelare il vero volto dell'amore. Qui in terra, al grano è sempre mescolata la zizzania, e la linea di demarcazione tra l'uno e l'altra non passa attraverso le pagine dei registri parrocchiali o per i confini delle nazioni, ma nel cuore e nella coscienza di ogni uomo. Si deve sempre ricordare che la separazione fra i buoni e i cattivi non si farà che al di là della morte.



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
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
