

TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

Along with the reform of the Roman Canon and the redrafting of an ancient Roman prayer in Eucharistic Prayer II, two additional prayers were announced in 1969. Eucharistic Prayer III is a fresh composition. Like Eucharistic Prayer II, it has no preface of its own, but the presider chooses from a long menu of possible prefices to become part of the prayer on a particular occasion. Also, like Eucharistic Prayer II it has a way to insert the name of the deceased in Masses for the dead such as funerals and memorials. The *General Instruction of the Roman Missal* views Eucharistic Prayer III as the best substitute for Eucharistic Prayer I on Sundays and feasts.

In practice, this prayer is used very often at Sunday Mass, and its texts are familiar to all members of the assembly. In this prayer, notice that the priest extends his hands over the gifts and calls down the Holy Spirit to change them into the Body and Blood of Christ. This call of the Holy Spirit is called the *epiclesis*, and Eastern Christians consider it to be the consecration. Latin Christians have long considered the "institution narrative" to be the consecration. Partly in response to a deep sensitivity to the East, the reformers took care to structure all our new prayers with a strong *epiclesis*. The poetry and images of Eucharistic Prayer III are fruitful sources of meditation. Why not take a sentence or two into your private prayer?

CALL UPON THE LORD

The very first line of today's first reading summons us to seek the Lord and to call upon God. This sentiment is echoed in the refrain for today's responsorial psalm: "The Lord is near to all who call upon him" (Psalm 145:18a). Saint Paul is the embodiment of someone who constantly sought the Lord. In the excerpt we read today from his letter to the Philippians, we find Saint Paul toward the end of his life, a life he describes as completely consonant with Christ. He writes, "For to me life is Christ" (Philippians 1:21). To find out what it means to live life completely in accord with Christ we need look no further than today's Gospel. There we find that God's love and mercy are immeasurable for all those who seek and call upon the Lord.



TRADICIONES DE NUESTRA FE

Las actas de los mártires son documentos de suma importancia en la Iglesia cristiana. En ellas se encuentra el testimonio de hombres y mujeres que con su sangre dieron testimonio del evangelio. En esta documentación encontramos el testimonio de quienes vieron y presenciaron su martirio. Por ejemplo, un soldado dice de los mártires: "Dormían en el suelo. No les vi quejarse en ningún momento y estuvieron todo el tiempo rezando y muy recogidos. . . magníficos, unos santos. . .".

Testimonios como éste eran comunes en los primeros siglos del cristianismo cuando en la Roma pagana se perseguía a la Iglesia primitiva. Lamentablemente, este testimonio no viene de hace 17 ó 19 siglos, más bien, viene del siglo pasado, siglo en el cual la persecución de cristianos se multiplicó por todas partes del mundo produciendo más mártires que ningún otro siglo.

El testimonio del soldado fue acerca del primer santo Argentino, Héctor Valdivielso Sáez y compañeros, quienes fueron asesinados por los comunistas en Asturias, España. Él fue uno de los más de 8000 cristianos martirizados en España, 30,000 en China, incontables en Latinoamérica y otros lugares durante el siglo pasado.

CLAMA AL SEÑOR

La primera línea de la lectura de hoy nos ordena buscar al Señor e invocar a Dios. Escuchamos el eco de este sentimiento en el refrán del salmo responsorial del día: “Cerca está el Señor de los que lo invocan” (Salmo 145:18a). San Pablo es la encarnación de alguien que constantemente buscó al Señor. En la cita que leímos hoy de su carta a los filipenses, encontramos a san Pablo hacia el final de su vida, vida que describe como en completa consonancia con Cristo. Escribe: “Porque para mí, la vida es Cristo” (Filipenses 1:21). Para saber lo que significa vivir una vida de completo acuerdo con Cristo basta mirar el Evangelio de hoy. Allí encontramos que el amor y la misericordia de Dios son incommensurables para todos los que buscan e invocan al Señor.

Fr. Feccia's Reflection

Venticinquesima domenica del T.O. — Dobbiamo confessare che proviamo un certo disagio di fronte alla parola degli operai dell'ultima ora, che dopo fatto appena in tempo a sporcarsi le mani, eppure ricevono il salario intero, come gli altri. E non ci sembra giusto il comportamento del padrone, che non accetta le rimostranze di quelli che sono stati assunti al mattino, disprezzando spudoratamente le leggi più elementari della giustizia sociale e distributiva. Se davvero il regno dei cieli è simile a tutto questo, si tratta di un universo al di fuori dei nostri principi di coerenza e della nostra logica. E la cosa è ancora più grave, in quanto Gesù racconta questa storia per giustificarsi: deve difendersi dalle malelingue che gli rimproverano la sua preferenza per persone di dubbia onestà e di facili costumi. Ha già risposto una volta che non sono i sani ad avere bisogno del medico, ma i malati (Mt. 9,12). Ora per rinforzare ulteriormente questa argomentazione, si appella al modo di agire di Dio stesso.

«*Sei invidioso perché io sono buono?*» In questa frase sta la chiave di tutto il discorso. Di fronte al comportamento insolito del padrone della parola, noi ragioniamo in termini di diritto dimenticando la generosità, l'amore, che ha le sue preferenze e le sue motivazioni segrete: «*Voglio dare a quest'ultimo quando a te!*» Dal momento che tutto ciò che possediamo l'abbiamo ricevuto da Dio (1Cor. 4,7), quali meriti possiamo far valere? E che diritto abbiamo di protestare? Si sentono alle volte, sulla bocca di certi cristiani, parole di questo tipo: «*La Chiesa non è più quella di una volta. Invece di essere la casa dei praticanti e delle persone irreprensibili, si volge verso gli indifferenti, e verso gente senza arte né parte, che non gode di una buona reputazione...*» Per fortuna! Questo significa che la chiesa si sta finalmente adattando ai modi di fare di Dio. Se lasciassimo sempre l'ultima parola alla bontà, e non alla giustizia in senso stretto, la realtà del regno sarebbe viva ed operante in mezzo a noi.

La scala dei valori — Di fronte all'urgenza del lavoro da compiere il problema non è tanto di non ferire qualcuno, quanto di far piacere a tutti. Ora, il lavoro che Dio affida (l'annuncio del vangelo), non è una ricompensa, ma un diritto che la persona umana ha su di noi: tutti hanno diritto al vangelo. A quanto livello il problema non è di fare le parti uguali, ma di soddisfare in pienezza. Dio chiama tutti, attivi e sfaccendati, pionieri e ritardatari. La chiesa non è proprietà dei fedeli che la compongono, ma Dio; tutti devono avervi il loro posto.

Giustizia degli uomini e giustizia di Dio

In ognuno di questi casi i testi oppongono alla giustizia di Dio, concepita alla maniera degli uomini, il suo comportamento misericordioso, nuovo per gli uomini (*Lc 15,1-2*). A questa obiezione Cristo risponde: il padrone della vigna è «giusto» (alla maniera umana) coi primi, poiché dà loro ciò che era stato convenuto, ed è «giusto» con gli ultimi (alla maniera divina), perché non era impegnato da alcuna conversione nei loro riguardi.

Afferma poi il primato della bontà di Dio: la sua maniera di agire non contrasta con la giustizia umana, ma la trascende totalmente nell'amore. Di conseguenza il patto concluso fra il padrone della vigna e i suoi operai si presenta come un'immagine dell'alleanza fra Dio e i suoi, alleanza che non ha alcun rapporto con il

contratto «do ut des» che i Giudei volevano trovarvi, ma è un atto gratuito di Dio (*Dt 7,7-10; 4,7*).

L'alleanza è pertanto un dono dell'amore gratuito del Padre, fondata sulla sua assoluta libertà e suppone la nostra (*Gal 3,16-22; 4,21-31*). Applicando una giustizia ai primi e un'altra agli ultimi, Dio vuole prima di tutto attestare il suo amore per gli uni e per gli altri, tenendo conto delle diverse situazioni in cui ciascuno si trova.

Gesù vuol mettere in guardia i suoi connazionali dall'orgoglioso atteggiamento di chi avanza pretese nei confronti di Dio e giudica la sua bontà e la scelta operata: Dio è buono e fedele e la sua bontà, proprio perché sovrana, trova nuovi modi di affermarsi sempre di più per il bene dei chiamati. Nello stesso tempo la conclusione della parola, in cui avviene un capovolgimento tra i primi e gli ultimi, vuoi essere un richiamo agli Ebrei che, primi alla chiamata di Dio, rischiano nella grettezza della loro giustizia di essere sopravanzati da coloro che sono stati chiamati successivamente, perché il regno è unicamente dono e grazia della bontà del Signore.



TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

The achievement of the late 1960s and early 1970s in enriching the “euchology” or “words of thanksgiving” available in the Church’s prayer is important on many levels. Ecumenically, it means that the Latin Rite now reflects the wealth of the East in having more than one prayer available to the Church. Pastorally, it actually acknowledges the place of the assembly in prayer, which is particularly clear in the Masses with Children. In fact, the traditional prayers of the Eastern Church served as models for our new prayers.

In the East, what we call the Eucharistic Prayer is called the *anaphora*, and there are three main families of *anaphora*. Each family has a different “recipe” for arranging the usual parts of these prayers. All *anaphora* have “intercessions” included, but the Churches of Antioch place them toward the end of the prayer, Alexandria prefers them at the beginning before the “Holy, Holy,” and Syria puts them at the very end. One branch of the Syrian family is unique in not mentioning the words of Jesus at the Last Supper. The Roman Canon we once prayed exclusively has some connection with the Alexandrian family, but once the signal for creativity was given, all the wealth of every prayer tradition was on the table, and our Sunday Mass has been greatly enriched.
