From the Pastor's Desk

XXVIII SUNDAY O.T. We continue our spiritual journey in this extraordinary missionary month: *Baptized and sent: the Church of Christ in mission in the world*, reflecting and making ours the call of Pope Francis to revive our missionary spirit in the experience of the grateful leper of the Gospel of this Sunday. 10 ten lepers were healed, only one goes back "glorifying God in a loud voice". We could say that by his action, the tenth leper is not only "cured" but also "saved". The other nine, all Jews, perhaps considered the healing as a right, because they were children of Abraham. The tenth, a Samaritan, a foreigner, felt healing as a grace, as an undeserved gift, which demanded to share love in return. He is an example for each one of us, so that we may receive God's free gift in our lives and give Him thanks for leaning over us. The Message of October's Missionary Month: *Baptized and Sent: The Church of Christ on Mission in the World*. Celebrating this

month will help us first to rediscover the missionary dimension of our faith in Jesus Christ, a faith graciously bestowed on us in baptism. Our filial relationship with God is not something simply private, but always in relation to the Church. Through our communion with God, Father, Son and Holy Spirit, we, together with so many of our other brothers and sisters, are born to new life. This divine life is not a product for sale, we do not practice proselytism, but a treasure to be given, communicated and proclaimed: that is the meaning of mission. We received this gift freely and we share it freely (*Mt 10:8*), without excluding anyone. God wills that all people be saved by coming to know the truth and experiencing his mercy through the ministry of the Church, the universal sacrament of salvation (*1 Tim 2:4*). The Church is on mission in the world. Faith in Jesus Christ enables us to see all things in their proper perspective, as we view the world with God's own eyes and heart. Hope opens us up to the eternal horizons of the divine life that we share. Charity, of which we have a foretaste in the sacraments and in fraternal love, impels us to go forth to the ends of the earth (*Mt 28:19*). A Church that presses forward to the farthest frontiers requires a constant and ongoing missionary conversion. How many saints, how many men and women of faith, witness to the fact that this unlimited openness, this going forth in mercy, is indeed possible and realistic, for it is driven by love and its deepest meaning as gift, sacrifice and gratuitousness (*2 Cor 5:14-21*)! The man who preaches God must be a man of God. This missionary mandate touches us personally: I am a mission, always; you are a mission, always; every baptized man and woman is a mission. People in love never stand still: they are drawn out of themselves; they are attracted and attract others in turn; they give themselves to others and build relationships that are life-giving. As far as God's love is concerned, no one is useless or insignificant. Each of us is a mission to the world, for each of us is the fruit of God's love. Even if parents can betray their love by lies, hatred and infidelity, God never takes back his gift of life. From eternity he has destined each of his children to share in his divine and eternal life (*Eph 1:3-6*). This life is bestowed on us in baptism, which grants us the gift of faith in Jesus Christ, the conqueror of sin and death. Baptism gives us rebirth in God's own image and likeness, and makes us members of the Body of Christ, which is the Church. In this sense, baptism is truly necessary for salvation for it ensures that we are always and everywhere sons and daughters in the house of the Father, and never orphans, strangers or slaves. What in the Christian is a sacramental reality, whose fulfillment is found in the Eucharist, remains the vocation and destiny of every man and woman in search of conversion and salvation. For baptism fulfills the promise of the gift of God that makes everyone a son or daughter in the Son. We are children of our natural parents, but in baptism we receive the origin of all fatherhood and true motherhood: no one can have God for a Father who does not have the Church for a mother. Our mission, then, is rooted in the fatherhood of God and the motherhood of the Church. The mandate given by the Risen Jesus at Easter is inherent in Baptism: as the Father has sent me, so I send you, filled with the Holy Spirit, for the reconciliation of the world (*Mt 28:16-20*). **To be continued**

Del Escritorio del Párroco

XXVIII DOMINGO T.O. Continuemos nuestro camino espiritual en este mes extraordinario misionero: *Bautizados y enviados: la Iglesia de Cristo en misión en el mundo*, reflexionando y haciendo nuestro el llamado de Papa Francisco en rescatar nuestro espíritu misionero en la vivencia del Leproso agradecido del Evangelio de este domingo. De 10 diez leprosos sanados, solo uno vuelve atrás "glorificando a Dios en alta voz". Podríamos decir que por su postura, el décimo leproso no queda solo "curado" sino también "salvado". Los otros nueve, todos judíos, tal vez consideraban la curación como algo obligado, por el hecho de ser hijos de Abrahán. El décimo, un samaritano, un extranjero, sintió la curación como una gracia, como un don no merecido, que exigía devolver amor a cambio. Él es un ejemplo para cada uno de nosotros, para que acojamos la conmoción gratuita de Dios sobre nuestra vida y le demos gracias por haberse inclinado sobre nosotros. La celebración de este mes nos ayudará en primer lugar a volver a encontrar el sentido misionero de nuestra adhesión de fe a Jesucristo, fe que hemos recibido gratuitamente como un don en el bautismo. Nuestra pertenencia filial a Dios no es un acto individual sino eclesial: la comunión con Dios, Padre, Hijo y Espíritu Santo, es fuente de una vida nueva junto a tantos otros hermanos y hermanas. Esta vida divina no es un producto para vender, nosotros no hacemos proselitismo, sino una riqueza para dar, para comunicar, para anunciar; este es el sentido de la misión. Gratuitamente hemos recibido este don y gratuitamente lo compartimos (*Mt 10,8*), sin excluir a nadie. Dios quiere que todos los hombres se salven y llegue conocimiento de la verdad, y a la experiencia de su misericordia, por medio de la Iglesia, sacramento universal de salvación (*1 Tm 2,4*). La Iglesia está en misión en el mundo: la fe en Jesucristo nos da la dimensión justa de todas las cosas haciéndonos ver el mundo con los ojos y el corazón de Dios; la esperanza nos abre a los horizontes eternos de la vida divina de la que participamos verdaderamente; la caridad, que pregustamos en los sacramentos y en el amor fraternal, nos conduce hasta los confines de la tierra (*Mt 28,19*). Una Iglesia en salida hasta los últimos confines exige una conversión misionera constante y permanente. Cuántos santos, cuántas mujeres y hombres de fe nos dan testimonio, nos muestran que es posible y realizable esta apertura ilimitada, esta salida misericordiosa, como impulso urgente del amor y como fruto de su intrínseca lógica de don, de sacrificio y de gratuidad (*2Co 5,14-21*). Porque ha de ser hombre de Dios quien a Dios tiene que predicar. Es un mandato que nos toca de cerca: yo soy siempre una misión; tú eres siempre una misión; todo bautizado y bautizada es una misión. Quien ama se pone en movimiento, sale de sí mismo, es atraído y atrae, se da al otro y teje relaciones que generan vida. Para el amor de Dios nadie es inútil e insignificante. Cada uno de nosotros es una misión en el mundo porque es fruto del amor de Dios. Aun cuando mi padre y mi madre hubieran traicionado el amor con la mentira, el odio y la infidelidad, Dios nunca renuncia al don de la vida, sino que destina a todos sus hijos, desde siempre, a su vida divina y eterna (*Ef 1,3-6*). Esta vida se nos comunica en el bautismo, que nos da la fe en Jesucristo vencedor del pecado y de la muerte, nos regenera a imagen y semejanza de Dios y nos introduce en el cuerpo de Cristo que es la Iglesia. En este sentido, el bautismo es realmente necesario para la salvación porque nos garantiza que somos hijos e hijas en la casa del Padre, siempre y en todas partes, nunca huérfanos, extranjeros o esclavos. Lo que en el cristiano es realidad sacramental, cuyo cumplimiento es la eucaristía, permanece como vocación y destino para todo hombre y mujer que espera la conversión y la salvación. De hecho, el bautismo es cumplimiento de la promesa del don divino que hace al ser humano hijo en el Hijo. Somos hijos de nuestros padres naturales, pero en el bautismo se nos da la paternidad originaria y la maternidad verdadera: no puede tener a Dios como padre quien no tiene a la Iglesia como madre.

Así, nuestra misión radica en la paternidad de Dios y en la maternidad de la Iglesia, porque el envío manifestado por Jesús en el mandato pascual es inherente al bautismo: como el Padre me ha enviado así también os envío yo, llenos del Espíritu Santo para la reconciliación del mundo (*Mt 28,16-20*). **Continuará...**

Fr. Feccia's Reflection

Ventottesima Domenica del T.O., Anno "C" — “Non sono stati guariti tutti e dieci? e gli altri nove dove sono?” La domanda di Gesù all’unico lebbroso che è ritornato sui suoi passi per rendere grazie, apre una delle pause più lunghe del vangelo. Gesù aspetta i nove assenti: non è possibile che non ritornino anche loro. Li chiana silenziosamente uno ad uno, e a ciascuno ripete la domanda: “Dove sei”? Sulla strada che lo conduce alla morte e alla risurrezione, su cui camminano anche coloro

che lo seguono per mezzo della fede in questo itinerario di salvezza, Gesù incontra la lebbra, una malattia che vieta di partecipare al culto e costringe l’individuo a evitare la presenza degli altri. I lebbrosi gridano la propria sventura a quell’uomo in cui la loro fede ha intuito un possibile salvatore. Inviandoli prima di tutto a coloro che hanno l’incarico ufficiale di constatare un’eventuale guarigione, Gesù non si limita di far una promessa, ma mette alla prova la loro fede. In quel momento infatti i dieci non son ancora guariti. Riacquisteranno lungo la strada, dopo aver obbedito alla parola di Gesù. La storia della fede comincia con Abramo. Il suo atteggiamento di fronte a Dio è un atteggiamento di fede. Anche se il nostro padre nella fede non ne ha percepito distintamente l’oggetto, tuttavia ha avuto tutte le condizioni personali necessarie alla fede: egli ha risposto prontamente “sì” alla chiamata di Dio, che sconvolge i suoi piani, disposto a dare tutto a lui, anche il figlio, abbandonando ogni calcolo umano. Egli ha superato le apparenti contraddizioni per rimettersi soltanto alla parola di Dio, e ha visto in essa la verità che salva. I profeti, durante tutta la storia del popolo di Dio, sono stati gli araldi della fede; lo hanno invitato a superare le assicurazioni e le alleanze umane per attaccarsi con confidenza alla parola data da Dio. Credere è darsi a Dio. Lo vediamo nella prima lettura. Dio sembra «assente» dalla storia. Il profeta lo interroga sull’enigma della oppressione e della ingiustizia che dilagano nella società. Nel Nuovo Testamento l’oggetto della fede raggiunge la pienezza: il Figlio si è manifestato e il suo regno si è costituito. Ma l’atteggiamento personale rimane identico: una decisione della volontà che ama, muove l’intelligenza a superare i calcoli umani per rimettersi a Dio con tutta fedeltà. La fede dunque non consiste tanto in una adesione intellettuale ad una serie di realtà umane, ma ad una persona, a Dio che ci propone il suo amore in Cristo morto e risorto. Per questo la fede è obbedienza a la comunione con lui, vittoria sulla solitudine: dono di Dio, ma un dono che aspetta la nostra libera risposta, che vuole diventare l’anima della nostra vita quotidiana e della comunità Cristiana. Una conoscenza nuova, un modo di leggere la realtà con gli occhi di Dio: “questa è la nostra vittoria che ha sconfitto il mondo” (1 S. Giovanni, 5,4). Oggi il cristiano vive in un mondo scristianizzato, da cui Dio è assente, che vive e si organizza senza di Lui. In questo mondo il cristiano con la sua fede ha il compito di smantellare le varie sicurezze ponendo gli interrogativi fondamentali, e di proporre a tutti la sua speranza.. La fede cristiana è quindi sfida a farsi propugnatrice di problemi che nessun laboratorio o calcolatore elettronico possono risolvere e che tuttavia decidono il destino dell’uomo e del mondo. Per il cristiano perciò è più che mai attuale l’invocazione dei discepoli: «Signore aumenta la nostra fede.»




