

WISDOM

We consider wisdom today. The first reading from the book of Wisdom presents this precious gift as a feminine spirit, a very desirable virtue sought by many and graciously present to all who seek her. In today's Gospel, Jesus tells a parable to illustrate wisdom in a practical, measurable way. The wise will conserve their resources, use them prudently, and mark the passing of time. The foolish, on the other hand, not planning ahead, will be in the dark. Both of these readings tell us how accessible wisdom is to all who simply and honestly seek it.

Paul's words to the Thessalonians are not about wisdom, but describe one result of true wisdom: To the wise person of faith even death holds no terror. Our faith in Jesus' resurrection tells us we will all one day rise to new life in Christ.

TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

We had sixteen hundred years' experience with one Eucharistic Prayer in our repertoire, and the liturgical reforms of the Council of Trent shaped the way we worshiped for four hundred years. In the last years of the Tridentine Mass, the early 1960s, we tended to see children as miniature adults. Fully rooted in the Sunday assembly by the decision of Pope Saint Pius X to push Communion back to the age of seven or so from the standard age of twelve to fourteen years during the early 1900s, children were still more tolerated than acknowledged. The Mass was in Latin, and by the 1960s the people had begun to regain their voices in the "dialogue Mass," so the focus was on training little children to recite or sing in Latin.


The new attention to the experience of children, their ability to enter into ritual, their spontaneity, their ability to grasp key concepts in faith, felt "untraditional." Yet we can trace in our tradition the ways in which children have long been given a special place in the assembly. From earliest times, boys have served in choirs and certain ministries in monasteries and in parish churches. Girls were sometimes entrusted to nuns, learning liturgical chants and the arts. Yet, in our day, the formation of a Lectionary for children and Eucharistic Prayers suited to them are truly tremendous breakthroughs in our treasury of prayer.



En 1682 unos negociantes encontraron una caja abandonada en una playa al sur de El Salvador. Como no pudieron abrirla decidieron llevársela al pueblito de San Miguel para conseguir con qué abrirla. Montaron la caja en un burrito y comenzaron su camino. Al pasar por la iglesia parroquial, el burrito se sentó y la caja se abrió revelando una bella imagen de la Virgen.

En aquel entonces el pueblo de El Salvador estaba dividido por la guerra pero con la llegada de esta imagen milagrosa el pueblo buscó reconciliarse. En 1833 hubo otra guerra en El Salvador y los que salieron victoriosos prometieron a María no vengarse en contra de los perdedores. Por estos hechos se le concedió a la imagen el nombre Nuestra Señora de la Paz. Su imagen de madera tallada y vestida lleva una palma en la mano recordando un milagro donde por la intercesión de la Virgen de la Paz, Dios salvó al pueblo de la explosión de un volcán. La palma recuerda que el humo que salía del volcán formaba una palma en el cielo.

LA SABIDURÍA

Nuestra tema de hoy es la sabiduría. La primera lectura del Libro de la Sabiduría presenta este valioso regalo como un espíritu femenino, una virtud muy deseable buscada por muchos y posible, por la gracia de Dios, para todos los que la buscan. En el Evangelio de hoy, Jesús relata una parábola para ilustrar de una manera práctica y concreta qué es la sabiduría. Los sabios conservan sus recursos, los usan prudentemente, con atención al paso del tiempo. Los tontos, por otro lado, por no planear su futuro, quedarán en la oscuridad. Las dos lecturas indican lo accesible que es la sabiduría a todos los que la buscan de manera sencilla y sincera. Las palabras de Pablo no tocan directamente el tema de la sabiduría, pero describen un resultado de la verdadera sabiduría: A la persona sabia de fe ni la muerte le asusta, porque nuestra fe en la resurrección de Jesús nos dice que todos vamos a despertar a una vida nueva en Cristo.



Fr. Feccia's Reflection

Trentaduesima domenica — Anno “A”. Il regno non è un porto di mare. Per accedere ad esso ci vuole una giustizia che superi quella degli scribi e dei farisei, e bisogna essere pronti ad accogliere in qualsiasi momento la sua venuta. Queste due tematiche ritornano con insistenza nel corso del primo vangelo.

Sentendo parlare di dieci damigelle d'onore che vanno a una cerimonia di nozze, potremmo aspettarci un'atmosfera di festa allegra e gioiosa. Ma non è questo lo stile di Matteo. Non troveremo nella parola danze e canzoni, ma un ceremoniale compassato, e una serie di anomalie che rivelano l'intenzione dell'evangelista di impartire un insegnamento sull'ultima venuta del Cristo e sul giudizio. Le dieci ragazze si addormentano tutte, senza eccezioni; non è questo il dramma, perché la parusia coglierà tutti di sorpresa. L'errore consiste piuttosto nel non avere preparato il necessario per la festa. Ben rifornita di olio, la lampada delle ragazze sagge risplenderà nella notte, permettendo l'incontro faccia a faccia con lo sposo. Le stolte invece, prese alla sprovvista come la cicala della favola, si daranno da fare troppo tardi, e si vedranno chiudere la porta in faccia.

Lo sposo arriva nel cuore della notte, secondo una convinzione molto antica nel giudaismo e nella chiesa. In quella notte della pasqua eterna, i credenti troveranno la pienezza del loro essere battesimale: incontrando il Cristo, passeranno dal sonno al risveglio, dalle tenebre alla luce.

In questa storia di nozze, è strano che non si parli della sposa. In passato il testo evangelico la menzionava, sulla base di certi manoscritti. Ma è meglio non parlare troppo in fretta. Perché questa sposa, che è la chiesa, è anche ciascun di noi, nella misura in cui si prepara attivamente, nella fede, alla venuta del Signore: «*io dormo, la il mio cuore veglia*» (Ct. 5,2). E il nostro cuore?

Non basta scegliere — Un matrimonio importante in un villaggio palestinese: dieci damigelle d'onore arrivano per scortare lo sposo verso la casa della sposa. Ma solo cinque di loro sono degne di entrare nella sala del banchetto: come mai questa intransigenza? Quando si è deciso di accompagnare lo sposo (cioè di essere veri cristiani), bisogna orientare tutto verso il Cristo, senza distendere la propria attenzione in una cosa di poco conto. Scegliere, è un conto; ma adottare i mezzi necessari per restare fedeli alla propria scelta e condurla al fine, è ben più importante.

L'autenticità cristiana


La violenza del linguaggio che Gesù adopera verso quei farisei che si erano seduti sulla cattedra di Mosè può sorprendere, a prima vista, ma è proporzionata alla gravità dello stravolgimento della vita religiosa che essi avevano provocato. Il rimprovero più sferzante che Gesù rivolge loro è quello dell'ipocrisia. Questi farisei erano dei credenti che si erano personalmente impegnati nell'avventura della fede e nella ricostruzione della vita religiosa del loro tempo. Sapevano benissimo che la fedeltà all'alleanza non si riduce a delle prestazioni cultuali, che, al contrario, importa precise esigenze morali. Conoscevano che esistono prescrizioni più importanti della Legge, quelle che riguardano la giustizia e la misericordia. Ma la paura di perdersi e di presentarsi a Dio a mani vuote, li conduceva a cercare all'interno stesso dell'avventura della fede un terreno di sicurezza dove operare la loro giustizia. Per arrivare a questo non c'era nulla di più facile che ridurre la fedeltà a Dio all'osservanza della Legge, la fede alla religione. A questo punto è possibile scoprirsi automaticamente migliori degli altri; le raffinatezze della casistica permettono di accentuare ancora di più il sentimento di superiorità; gli altri vengono caricati di fardelli insopportabili, mentre si può approfittare delle risorse della casistica per raggirare la legge. Qui l'ipocrisia è manifesta: chi ha spirito farisaico mente a se stesso e inganna gli altri. Egli ha tutta l'apparenza della vera fedeltà a Iahvè, ma in realtà la religione che testimonia è estranea all'avventura della fede, e anziché condurre a Dio gli uomini non fa che attirare gli sguardi su di sé; senza neppure avvedersene egli in tutto ciò che fa cerca soltanto di farsi notare.
